NPUCC Annual Meeting Minutes ~ May 20, 2018

Call to Order: Nancy Knudsen

The meeting was opened by Nancy at the conclusion of the regular church worship service which was held in Fellowship Hall. Annual reports were passed out to everyone. Nancy thanked all the people in the church who have donated their time and talents throughout the past year. She reviewed the Church's Mission Statement:

Our Purpose: God calls Normandy Park United Church of Christ to make a spiritual difference in people's lives through fellowship, worship and service.

Our Mission: To create a vibrant church community that serves our neighborhood and world.

Our Vision: A loving faith community where all are nurtured and people's lives are changed.

Some accomplishments from the year were hi-lighted including:

- Rummage Sale whose proceeds supported hurricane relief, people who were displaced by the fires in California and the Church Council of Greater Seattle.
- Bed Roll Project which is currently housed in the basement of the parsonage.
- Participation in the Ecumenical Leadership Circle, a group of 5 churches that meet regularly to think about the relationship between our churches and our neighborhoods.

Visioning to Action: We (the congregation) will be discussing what additional actions towards our mission we might take in the future, with Pastor Amy.

Budget Report: Brian Russell

- The church is in good shape financially. We are continuing to save money under pastoral expense. Currently we are under budget for pledges which is possibly accounted for by members that give yearly but over income for non-pledge monies. We are meeting projections for expenditures and income.
- We now have consistency in the budget with the hire of Amy Hitchens as our new called 75%-time pastor.
- Church Council is in the process of deciding how to best use the parsonage to generate income. Whatever the decision on the parsonage, the church is projected to remain financially strong.

Election of Officers/New Committee Members: Nancy Knudsen

- A quorum was verified with 45 members in attendance and 6 absentee ballots. (43 members were needed for a quorum).
- A vote was called for the election of Bob George as Moderator and Lisa Lincoln as Co-Chair of Outreach/Parish Care. Passed unanimously.

- A vote was called for the election of new committee members who will start in September: Rose Hall (Christian Education); Steve Allen, Cathy Larson and Charlene Salisbury (Worship Committee); Jeff Clark (Budget/Finance) and Nancy Allen, Nancy Knudsen (Pastoral Relations). Passed unanimously.
- The following positions remain open: Vice Moderator, one opening on Personnel Committee and 2-3 openings on Worship Committee.

Pastoral Search Committee: Nancy Knudsen

- The following individuals were thanked for their hours of work on the Pastoral Search Committee: Susan Sasis (chair), Drew Clark (secretary), CB Stack (chaplain), Azure Allender, Kevin Peterson, Charlene Salisbury and Dorine Seaquist.
- Amy Hitchens has been officially called as our 75%-time pastor. Her compensation package was approved by the Church Council. Amy's first Sunday will be June 3, 2018.

Safer Church Policy: Kevin Peterson

The Safer Church policy addresses the following:

- Adult leader to youth ratio at 1 to 5.
- Social networking
- Appropriate/inappropriate behaviors
- Becoming an adult leader
- Reporting and liability
- Includes training videos and background checks for Sunday School Teachers. Lynn is developing a roll out plan for training. Initial training activities will be directed toward people serving our youth and vulnerable populations.

NPUCC Website: Nancy led us on a walkthrough of the new NPUCC website. She also showed our NPUCC Facebook page.

Discussion: Nancy Knudsen

Nancy opened the floor for comments or discussion:

- People agreed that the Website looked good.
- Consider the posting annual report and the safe church policy on the website.
- The AV set-up in Fellowship Hall worked well for the church service and meeting.
- The large white screen is difficult to see for people with vision impairments. A screen that is black with white lettering would be easier to see.

The meeting was closed by singing Grace (led by Kevin and Susan) before the potluck.

NPUCC Congregational Budget Meeting ~ December 2, 2018

Call to Order: Vicki Nichols

The meeting was opened by Vicki prior to the benediction of the regular church worship service. Vicki introduced herself as the Vice Moderator and explained that Bob George, the Moderator, was out of town. A quorum was verified with 54 members in attendance.

Budget Report: Brian Russell

Brian thanked all members of the church for their continuing support. He recognized Lynn Zachow, Financial Secretary, for her continued work and excellence. Brian reviewed the figures of the 2019 Budget Proposal and stated that the church is in good financial shape. Currently, we are over budget for income and under budget for spending. He pointed out that the budgets from 2018 and 2019 were very similar and the new budget for 2019 was \$1,585 less than the prior year's budget.

Comments and Questions:

- Nancy Knudsen, the past Moderator, made a clarification about the pastor's salary. Although the pastor's salary appears to be reduced; in reality it is the way the pastor has chosen to allocate her salary by placing part of her income into the pension plan.
- Lynn Zachow further clarified that the church does not pay for the pastor's medical insurance because she is otherwise covered.
- Barb Gregg indicated that Mary's Place and Immigration Expense have been added as line items under Outreach/Parish Care.

No other questions/concerns were entertained.

Motion:

The Vice Moderator called for a vote. A motion was made to accept the budget proposal by Steve Allen and seconded by Nancy Knudsen. The 2019 Budget was unanimously approved.

PASTOR'S REFLECTION

Dear Good People of Normandy Park UCC,

As I type this report for you, it has been a year since my candidating Sunday and the call from you all and the Holy Spirit to be your settled pastor.

And what a year it has been! As I reflect on the work that we have done together—more than a few things stand out—God is good:

- We hosted an interfaith vigil with our partners, The Church Council of Greater Seattle, in June of 2018. Over 300 concerned community members gathered together in solidarity regarding family separation and the detainment of asylum seekers.
- Our youth raised money and participated in the UCC Western Regional Youth Event in Hawaii.
- Our study group last fall focused on immigrant welcome and the issues and needs of immigrants in our local community as well as the realities faced in the northern triangle of Central America.
- We hosted the Taproot Theatre during Advent, which offered a play as a form of outreach to our local community and was generously sponsored by a church member and another friend of the church.
- We participated with the Highline Ecumenical Leadership Circle with the Church Council of Greater Seattle and partner with them in community organizing work regarding immigration and affordable housing needs in our local community.
- We have piloted a monthly Bible study gathering called "Bibles and Brews". We started with "Why the Bible?" and have studied a brief overview of the Psalms.
- We convened a follow up visioning event "May the 4th Be With You" building on the work that was completed with Interim Minister, Rev. Eric Dale.
- We continue to host our monthly community dinner, with 45-50 people joining us for a meal each month.

That is quite a list—with a good mix of trying on new things and continuing with relationships and partnerships that serve our local community.

What a joy it is to continue to work with Kirsten Pangelinan, Office Manager, and Kevin Peterson, Director of Music. It is a collaborative and team effort with a dose of fun mixed in! We are very fortunate to have Kirsten and Kevin as staff here at this church.

In the past year, Amalia Mendoza has joined us officially as our custodian. Her sister had the role before her. I have known Amalia for more than 15 years. We worked together at Highline Medical Center; she in environmental services. Amalia usually works on Fridays, but occasionally on another day of the week if her hospital work week changes.

We have one new honorary staff member and that is Teddy "Bear" Thomas, our church dog. He has office hours Monday through Thursday.

I have been an active member of the following committees: Parish Care/Outreach Committee, Worship Committee, Christian Education, Pastoral Relations and Personnel.

In Parish Care, different committee members and I have made joint visits together to see our homebound members and those who cannot get to church on a regular basis. We try to at least make quarterly visits to keep up with folks. I have also visited or talked with members and their family members who have found themselves unexpectedly in the hospital or on hospice. Prayer is such an important part of the healing process and we need to celebrate how much parish care and pastoral care remains such a value in this church. For many years, we had a dedicated card writer, she knows who she is, and I want to thank her for her care and attention to all people and situations that came across her path. We will do our best to keep up the tradition on the committee—with cards, emails and phone calls.

The Worship Committee has enjoyed exploring the expression of the arts in worship in the past year. Barbara Gregg sewed new Lenten and Ordinary time paraments for us, in purples and greens respectively. Thank you Barbara!

We have also had some fun continuing to learn ways that we can bring to life the gospel stories through skits and midrash. The Spiritual Travelers joined us again this year toward the end of Lent, sharing a carefully studied text of the musings of Mary, Martha and Lazarus just before Jesus was taken to his death. We also have experimented with using the projector to share images during worship and also have introduced some new songs.

I want to take a moment to thank Drew Clark and Jim Vaughan in their roles in coordinating Head Usher duties. Drew Clark has taken over for Jim Vaughan. We are so grateful for this service to the church!

I can truly feel the Spirit at work at Normandy Park United Church of Christ. The Spirit encourages, asks us to stretch and grow in ways that might not always be comfortable. We always have the opportunity to learn, to be open, and to listen for the ways that we are being called into the future. Our visioning event is a visible sign of this movement, as is any time we have new members join the church or celebrate a baptism. We are blessed to have welcomed new members Judy Jacobson, Fred Chapman, Jim Salisbury, Denene Salisbury, Megan Sheppard and Shannon Thomas officially into the church and to have just baptized Mathias Sasis. Greetings to all as we approach the end of my first year as Moderator, round two. It's been a very interesting time for me this year, aligning with our new Settled Pastor, in her first year. As some of you will recall, my Moderator round one commenced with our previous Settled Pastor in his first year. While I search to understand if this is coincidence or plan, it has proven rewarding.

Our mission, at NPUCC, seems to be more about outreach to our community than an average congregation. Given our size, compared to what we accomplish, we should all stand tall knowing the amount of good we provide. The following report should provide highlights of this fact, but in my notes, I will provide some of the things that resonate for me. Below are brief highlights:

- Our Pastoral Relations committee gained strength this past year, with Amy's direction
 and the previous work in our Visioning meetings, we held a very successful Visioning
 meeting earlier this month. We have identified areas for focus on improving on what
 we do as our mission and how to improve our community awareness. As the year
 progresses, we will have small focus groups working on areas identified in the Visioning

- During the Annual Conference meeting last month, it became apparent that
 membership numbers are changing in all the churches in the conference. Another thing
 of which we should be proud is our contribution to Our Churches Wider Mission
 (OCWM). The dollar amount we contribute, in comparison to other much larger
 churches, speaks loudly to our small but mighty presence.
- Our facility has been getting some good use by outside organizations. This provides a
 visibility to our church that is immeasurable in value. When people arrive here and see
 the beautiful grounds, of which our facilities team is responsible, they want to come
 back.
- As our church building ages, we continue to provide upgrades. Two very important items were the window upgrades and the coming furnace upgrade. We are very fortunate to have the fiscal power to do these items. Some fiscal assistance also materialized with the sale of a slice of our property on the North side. This will not ever be noticeable for anything we do for our building, but it was a fortunate element just as one of our furnaces expired.

• This past year's rummage sale reached new highs with the income and, as Nancy pointed out last year, we do great things with these dollars. Our outreach is awesome!

As we see new members joining, and existing members stretching their contributions, we continue to be an extremely viable contribution to the neighboring community. Let's keep our focus on the important things in life, improvement of that in which we are Stewards, and make sure we love our neighbors like we love ourselves.

Go forward with God's speed, and thank you all so very much for everything. Hallelujah!

2018-2019 Accomplishments:

Vacation Bible School ~ Summer, 2018

This past summer we choose to do a non-traditional VBS since our children have aged out of our traditional VBS. Instead of one week of activities, we spread them over the summer.

1) A "BBQ and Beds" event started with burgers and hotdogs after which the kids planted some "purple" bean starts and corn, beans, and squash which when planted together are called the "three sisters." The produce was harvested for the Community Meal. 2) A group took the light rail downtown for "Faith and Family" Sunday at the Mariner's. 3) A pool party with a potluck took place at Olympic View Swim and Tennis Club.

Twenty-four women started our retreat in South Lodge with a soup supper. We spent the weekend getting to know each other better - we ate food that we didn't have to cook,

indulged in chocolate and wine, stole the prized gift in our annual exchange, enjoyed the great outdoors, took a nap, watched the movie "Happy" followed by discussion, and, of course, the retreat is not complete without a bedtime story. On Sunday morning we gathered together in celebration of each other and shared communion.

Family First Intergenerational Events

Throughout the year we engaged our youth and adults in a variety of activities including:

- memory jars
- making/selling gift tags to buy Christmas presents for Mary's Place \$350.60 was raised

- Prepped parsonage for occupancy
 - Allows NPUCC to have on-site attention for landscape, rental space supervision and lockup security.
- Service eight furnaces annually.
- Ongoing maintenance of roof area and cleaned scuppers/gutters of debris.
- Selling 600 feet of land to northwest neighbor to accommodate their requested building permit.
- Come June the church offices and conference room will replace its resistive heat with a green energy heat and cooling via a mini split heat pump.
- Replaced office windows with vinyl double pane windows in anticipation of the heat pump.
- Installed motion light in paraments closet.
- Routine maintenance of ongoing issues needing attention to include signage, security, locks, doors, benches, toilets, paint, lawn equipment, sound system, etc.
- Routine maintenance of the kitchen appliances, accoutrements, and supplies.

The Parish Care team, assisted by members of our congregation, supports our church family in times of crisis, illness, or bereavement. We send cards, make home, care facility and phone visits, and assist with local transportation when possible. PC members are not primary hands-on health caregivers, but encourage the congregation to use community resources.

PC/Outreach members serve as long as they wish. Meetings are the 2nd Wednesday of the month at 3:30 pm in the Fireside Room. Usually we do not meet in December and July. PC and Outreach merged their meetings as of September 13, 2017.

We are also called to care for the wider community. We appreciate the support we are given by Amy and the members of NPUCC. This congregation continues to be very compassionate, giving of their time, talent, and treasure. Within our denomination, NPUCC supports five UCC Offerings each year—Neighbors in Need, the Christmas Fund, One Great Hour of Sharing, Our Church's Wider Mission, and Strengthen the Church. OCWM is a budgeted item.

Exercise group led by Alice meets Monday and Thursdays at 10:00 am in the Fellowship Hall.

The Community Meal is offered on the 4th Tuesday of the month at 4:30 pm in the Fellowship Hall. This ministry started in January, 2013. Kudos to Madeleine for organizing and leading the team that prepares, serves, sets up and cleans up. Thanks to the Boy Scouts who take down the tables for us.

NPUCC hosts 2 Scout troops: Boy Scout Troop 398 and Girl Scout Troop 44039.

AA meets at NPUCC on Saturdays.

NPUCC cooks for Hospitality House 4 to 5 times a year. Alice is our meal coordinator. Our donation months are February and August.

NPUCC financially supports the Des Moines Area Food Bank, Hospitality House, and Mary's Place. The first quarter of 2019 we also supported the Northwest Immigrant Rights Project. \$50/month is set aside for immigrant causes.

Friends and guests are welcomed at the Ladies' Lunch on the first Friday of each month; it is arranged by Malinda Vaughan.

Caring Hands bedroll project, led by Carol Scotton Towle, meets in the parsonage basement sewing up bedrolls for the homeless.

Highline Ecumenical Leadership Circle, coordinated by the Church Council of Greater Seattle meets monthly. NPUCC is a member church along with other area churches.

NPUCC collects canned food and nonperishable items for the DMAFB 4/year: the first Sunday of September, December, February (Souper Bowl of Caring), and June.

May 6, 2018 – NPUCC participated in the Des Moines/Highline CROP Hunger Walk in Des Moines with 10 walkers. Our church raised \$3,944. The grand total for the 11 groups and 68 participants was \$12,364.

Summer 2018 – Amy, Alice, Dave Andresen and Jim Spraker visit Rev. Bob Haertig at a nearby adult family home.

June 18, 2018 – NPUCC hosted an Interfaith Vigil in the sanctuary to a full church of 300+. Program by CCGS and the ELC. Guests were speaking out against the separation of families and the unlawful detention of asylum seekers at the SeaTac Federal Detention Center.

September 15, 2018 – Hospitality House Walk for the Women raised over \$23,000.

August 1, 2018 – potluck lunch meeting at Lisa's at Horsehead Bay.

October 4, 2018 – Amy led the Blessing of the Animals on St. Francis Day.

October 20-21, 2018 – Annual Rummage Sale raised \$5,000. Half was designated to outreach causes: \$500 to CCGS, \$1,000 each to CWS Hurricane & Disaster Relief and UCC Immigrant Justice.

November 3, 2018 – Alice, Dorine, Lee Weber attend the HH Volunteer Appreciation Luncheon at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church.
