### **Call to Order: Bob George**

### **Annual Meeting Minutes 2019:**

Sue Janke confirmed that we have a quorum present with 50 members logged into the zoom meeting (46 members required for a quorum).

Sue Janke thanked Alice McGregor for acting as church clerk last year and briefly presented the annual meeting minutes from 2019. A vote was called to accept the minutes and voting was completed using a screen shot of members present. The screen shot indicated 52 members unanimously approved the minutes.

- Worship committee would welcome more members.

### **Vote on Council Members and Committee Chairs:**

A screen shot indicated 58 members unanimously approved the motion.

### **Financial Report: Brian Russell**

- Brian thanked everyone for their continued financial support and volunteer work throughout the year. He especially thanked Lynn Zachow for all her work/time as financial secretary.
- Brian reports that in spite of Covid-19 the church is in good financial shape. Our income is down in room use but pledge income and other income has been consistent. The good news is that expenses are also down so the drop in income is actually offset by the drop in expenses.

### **Closing of Annual Meeting:**

Bob closed the meeting at 10:50 am with a prayer. The congregation then returned to worship, singing the "Gloria Patri."

## **NPUCC Congregational Budget Meeting via Zoom ~ November 8, 2020**

### **Call to Order** – Vicki Nichols, Church Moderator

The meeting was opened by Vicki prior to the benediction of the regular church worship service. A quorum (46 members) was verified with 48 members in attendance on Zoom and 5 proxy votes for a total of 53 voting members. The Proposed Budget handouts were distributed to church members prior to the meeting either by a door drop or by individuals picking up their copies at the church. Vicki thanked the church council and church membership for all their support during the year.

### **Budget Report** – Brian Russell, Finance Chair

Brian thanked all members of the church for their continuing financial support. NPUCC has been incredibly blessed by its membership especially during this time of COVID-19. Additionally, Brian thanked the members of the finance committee and specifically recognized Lynn Zachow, Financial Secretary, for her continued work and excellence.

Brian reviewed the figures of the 2021 Budget Proposal. He pointed out differences in the line items between the 2020 and 2021 budget. The 2021 budget includes an overall increase of \$3,171 which includes an additional \$3,000 for facilities as it is expected that church maintenance costs will continue to increase. Raises of 2% each were included for the pastor, music director and church office manager. The finance committee feels this increase is attainable.

Overall, the church is in good financial shape. Brian stated that up until October of this year, our decrease in income has been balanced out by our decrease in expenses. At this time that trend is not holding so it is important that everyone get their pledges turned into the church.

### **Comments and Questions**

Brian opened up the meeting for discussion/questions.

Member #1: Questioned how the finance committee is addressing income and increases in insurance fees?

Response: The finance committee reviews the budget on a monthly basis and we have been on track for the first 9 months of the year.

Member #2: Questioned why it appears that the music budget has been cut by \$555.

Response: The reason for the decrease in budget is due to less expenses for special musicians, substitute musicians for when Kevin is gone and purchasing choir music.

Member #3: Stated that it is important to remain proactive and review the budget earlier and bring it back to the membership in the event that we are not meeting the proposed budget.

**Motion**

The Moderator called for a vote. A motion was made to accept the budget proposal by Brian Russell and seconded by Lori Comen. The 2021 Budget was unanimously approved.

## PASTOR'S REFLECTION

Dear Siblings in Christ,

In the life of the church, this year has been full of pivoting, flexibility, and hope. I have been amazed at our conviction to keep going, to care for others, and engage our local communities in the ways that we can during this pandemic. I wish the pandemic were over, but it is not and this fact colors all of the ways that we are engaging in church together.

Time has been an ever wavy, flickering, wily thing, and so instead of being linear in my remembering from the summer of 2020 until now, I will offer you impressions.

- Zoom has been a lifeline. With zoom we have been held council meetings and worship services; we hosted a women's retreat and book studies. We did the work of the church virtually. And while we learned what zoom fatigue means, it remains a vehicle for being together, when otherwise we might have to be apart. I am heartened by all our members and friends who have joined us from afar this year—from Pt. Townsend, Whidbey Island, Florida, and Louisiana to name a few. This is a remarkable achievement through zoom.
- We have learned to become more creative in our worshiping together. We have tried nearly every format possible that we can possibly try: on zoom, in person hybrid style, and now outdoor worship. If you had asked me in 2019 about this, I think I might have laughed. And then possibly cried, because it didn't seem possible before.
- Much gratitude to Kevin Peterson and the Council who have been involved in troubleshooting and technology upgrades. Kevin has pivoted just like I did to produce a worship service that is meaningful and participatory. Yes, we still have glitches! We will likely always have glitches here and there.
- Some highlights for me in our worship together: lighting candles on the labyrinth for All Saint's Day; our virtual Christmas Pageant; our first ever virtual Easter Pageant, all of the door dash deliveries that augmented our worship from home, our first in person hybrid worship together this summer and our first outdoor worship service together in August.
- We must celebrate our continued our partnerships with international and local ministries and organizations—whether it be the CROP walk and Church World Service, accompanying the women at Hospitality House, Christmas giving with Mary's Place, or being 5 for 5 in giving to our denomination's important special offerings. We have stayed steady. We have kept our commitments and, in some instances, exceeded all of our expectations.

- We are still connected to the Ecumenical Leadership Circle funded by The Church Council of Greater Seattle and I personally have been part of a lectionary Bible study with ELC women pastors for almost 2 years now.
- Even though we had to pause our community “to go” dinner in September, we still have a feeding ministry with providing meals to those in re-entry housing at Kate’s Foundation. Every week, Madeleine makes a meal, with your support, and my spouse delivers it to folx who were formerly incarcerated.
- Some of my favorite moments in the midst of our stay-at-home orders were our donation drop off days after zoom church—seeing everyone’s masked faces as they dropped off their items from their cars.
- Last but not least on my highlight reel—yes, I am still studying and teaching the enneagram. We have been working through curriculum from Life in the Trinity Ministries and I am excited to announce that Suzanne Stabile will be publishing a new book in the fall, just about the time we will wrap up our current study.

I want to thank Kirsten for keeping the office running in the midst of everything, for her willingness to change up her workflow as things continued to change, and for Kevin’s partnership in worship. I also want to thank our Church Council and all of you for helping keep this community vital. We will have the Normandy Park Preschool in our nursery, our Scout Troop has grown in the past year, and hopefully our youth will be able to reconnect with other through activities and during church again, once the Delta variant peaks out.

And finally--there is so much gratitude for the success of our Care, Share and Repair Project. Thank you and thank you again.

I will close with a prayer I found from our Summer Occasional Summer Series “I have been meaning to ask...” *from A Sanctified Art*

## **MODERATOR'S WELCOME AND REPORT**

The second new addition is the slot car track in the Fellowship Hall. This is going to be an interesting new use of Fellowship Hall as we move into the future.

The AA group has returned to meeting at the church. They are now meeting in the Fellowship Hall. Boy Scouts are back to meeting on our Church Grounds. Malamalama has begun meeting back in the church. These groups are meeting and have been instructed to follow COVID guidelines.

The Church Council continues to meet monthly on Zoom, reporting and guiding the Church in its mission. I wish to thank the Council for all their hard work, their conversations and thoughts throughout these unprecedented times. Further, I wish to thank the staff, Amy Kevin and Kirsten, who have continued to guide and lead us through these times. They have kept adapting their roles as needed so we can continue to function as a church body of believers.

## **DIRECTOR OF MUSIC'S REPORT**

Trying to serve as Director of Music during a pandemic has been the equivalent of playing Whack-a-Mole while blindfolded and running on a treadmill. Just when you think you've solved one issue, another one arises to demand your attention; everything is a moving target; and the rules are made up and the points don't matter!

There has not been any easy way to minister through music during this pandemic year. The choir continued to meet regularly via Zoom, and then via the Upbeat Music app so we could rehearse as best we could while distanced. However, the technology hurdles and learning curve have been steep, and frankly, trying to sing without the benefit of hearing everyone else's voices around you is nearly impossible. I am ever grateful to the choir for their flexibility, patience, and grit to make singing together work. We were even able to get a couple videos produced to use in worship! While the choir is currently on summer hiatus, I am hopeful we can continue gathering virtually in the coming year.

At the onset of the pandemic, I recorded videos of a prelude, offertory, and postlude and uploaded them each week to the church website and YouTube channel. Due to low view counts I discontinued that, but instead began offering a live prelude at the start of every worship service in November. That will continue into the future.

One significant change in music this year is the music I chose to play for preludes, which is limited due to copyright liability. Because we are now live-streaming and archiving our worship services I am not allowed to play a significant portion of the music I formerly used for my solo selections, and the licensing cost to allow me to do that is prohibitive. If you're wondering why you've heard a lot more classical music lately, that's why – it's all in the public domain! This has also carried over to our hymn selections for congregational singing, but the cost of the two licenses we purchase to authorize streaming and archiving more recently-composed hymns are very reasonable for our size congregation.

Technology has also been a major learning curve for us in the past year, and I appreciate Vicki and the Church Council authorizing the purchase of new audio equipment for us to make in-person worship possible. Thank you, also, to Mari, Shannon, Ian, and Lynn for serving as technology support for our hybrid worship.

Many, many thanks as always go to Amy and Kirsten; I could not ask for a better team to collaborate in ministry with. Thank you, too, to the choir for their patience and support during this year. Finally, a major thank you to all of you. I am deeply grateful to all of you who make this community of faith so vibrant and life-giving to me and to so many others in our church, neighborhood, and beyond. It remains a great honor and privilege to serve in ministry with you as your director of music.

### 2020-21 Accomplishments:

We have weathered the Covid-19 pandemic well during the last year. We again are thankful for the financial support we have received from the congregation during the last year. This support is particularly impressive considering we have had to go to Zoom videoconferencing for all of our services and meetings. Everyone has stepped up to meet this challenge and we appreciate your efforts. Our finance secretary, Lynn Zachow, is due much of the credit for her many hours devoted to our church finances. Thank you, Lynn.

One blessing I am particularly proud of and thankful for (pardon the grammar) was the congregation's response to our capital campaign. The church was confronted with the task of making much needed expensive repairs to our church building (God's house). I was amazed. Not only did our church keep up their financial support of our operating expenses, but you exceeded all my expectations in additionally funding these repairs. Thank you.

### 2020-2021 Accomplishments:

#### BOOK DISCUSSIONS

- Climate Church, Climate World: How People of Faith Must Work for Change by Jim Antal and Bill McKibben  
We continued reading how “climate change is the greatest moral challenge humanity has ever faced. Hunger, refugees, poverty, inequality, deadly viruses, war—climate change multiplies all forms of global social injustice.”
- White Fragility: Why It's So Hard for White People to Talk About Racism by Robin DiAngelo

#### SEAHURST BEACH PARK CLEAN UP ~ AUGUST 15, 2020

Ten people from NPUCC participated in a beach cleanup at Seahurst Beach Park, removing several hundred items from the beach, keeping plastic and other garbage out of the food chain. Some of the odd things found were a washcloth and plastic netting.

## PARISH CARE AND OUTREACH COMMITTEE REPORT

The Parish Care team, assisted by Pastor Amy and members of our congregation, supports our church family in times of crisis, illness, or bereavement. We send cards, emails, letters and text messages, and make phone visits. In-person visits have become problematic during the Covid-19 pandemic, especially for care facilities. We assist with local transportation.

Parish Care and Outreach merged their meetings as of September 13, 2017.

We are also called to care for the wider community. We appreciate the support we are given by Pastor Amy and the members of NPUCC. This congregation continues to be very compassionate and generous, giving of their time, talent, and treasure. Within our denomination, NPUCC supports five UCC Offerings each year—Neighbors in Need, the Christmas Fund, One Great Hour of Sharing, Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM), and Strengthen the Church. OCWM is a budgeted item.

NPUCC financially supports the **Des Moines Area Food Bank**, **Hospitality House**, and **Mary's Place**. Each quarter the committee supports an **immigrant cause**. Since 2019 we have given to the NW Immigrant Rights Project ([nwirp.org](http://nwirp.org)), Raices ([raicetexas.org](http://raicetexas.org)), UCC Immigrant Justice, and WA Immigrant Solidarity Network ([waisn.org](http://waisn.org)). In January, 2021 we paid our annual dues to **Earth Ministry** and **The Church Council of Greater Seattle** through our budget.

Because of the Covid–19 pandemic, Community Meals in Fellowship Hall, Exercise Class, Ladies' Lunch, the annual Rummage Sale, Christmas caroling to care facilities, and the Marvista Lunch Buddy Program, have been put on hold since mid-March, 2020. We morphed the Community Meals into a "To Go" Meal and distributed out front as a drive by. We did six **"To Go" Meals** before stopping after the August, 2020 meal. Carol Scotton Towle has continued the bedroll project from her home. The Boy Scouts and AA resumed their meetings at the church this summer.

## **2020-2021 Accomplishments:**

Madeleine has graciously taken on Wednesday weekly meals for **Kate's Foundation**. There are five Kate's Foundation Houses in White Center and Madeleine cooks for 10 people (one house) each week. Shannon stops by Madeleine's home and delivers the meal. Madeleine's first meal was November 11, 2020. She has continued this ministry except for when Shannon is on vacation.

NPUCC cooks for **Hospitality House** five times a year. Alice is our meal coordinator. We are most grateful for our faithful dozen cooks who fill out our week. Our donation months are February and August. During this Covid time we have had great success in our donation drive-arounds. Thank you for your enthusiastic response! We also appreciate your support of the annual Walk for the Women and the Spring Fling (both virtual the past 2 years). This Saturday, September 18 Walk for the Women event can be virtual or in-person. The in-person venue is St. Francis' parking lot where we will do laps.

NPUCC collects canned food and nonperishable items for the **Des Moines Area Food Bank**. During Covid we have held highly successful donation drives after Zoom church. We are pleased to have Connie and Jeff Clark on the DMAFB Board. Hopefully this fall we will have a group from church doing school lunch prep at the food bank.

Highline **Ecumenical Leadership Circle** (ELC) has started to meet again with new leadership. 2019's focus was on housing and renters' rights. Amy continues to meet often with Pastor Jenny from Highline United Methodist and Pastor Lina from Lake Burien Presbyterian and other women clergy.

August 2020 – Barbara organizes small group tours of the Highline-SeaTac Botanical Garden.

October 4, 2020 – Amy leads the **Blessing of the Animals** on St. Francis Day.

October 20 and October 23, 2020 – Thanks to Nancy Knudsen and Lee Weber for picking up school lunches from Seahurst Elementary for Lake Burien Presbyterian Church kids.

November 1, 2020 – All Saints Sunday – Thanks to Nancy and Steve Allen for setting up the Remembrance Table outside on the labyrinth. There were drop off stations for the DMAFB and Hospitality House donations.
