I am writing to you on All Saints Day, which we will celebrate this coming Sunday, November 5<sup>th</sup>, during worship. We will light candles for those in our congregation who have passed on in the last year and there will be a time for you to light candles for your own beloveds who have died. I am also aware of all the heartbreaking news that is to be had whenever and however we source our media—the conflict between Palestine/Israel, the ongoing war in Ukraine, the ongoing gun violence in our communities, the warnings we keep receiving from scientists about climate change. When faced with all of this and more, it is good for us to gather and to pray—like we did at the All Church Retreat last weekend, like we will this Sunday, and in the Sundays to come.

Rev. Karyn Frazier, Pastor at Fauntleroy Church shared this meditation with a clergy group I am in last week, it is written by Unitarian pastor, Rev. David Miller.

"Our hearts, so often broken by our inhumanity to each other, already so bruised by the unnecessary brutality of dictators and our own internal conflicts, is now again, still, adding the pain and sorrow of those so brutally damaged in the Middle East by those whose ongoing differences breed such endless and senseless destruction. To assume any clear answer feels foolish, to give up hope feels tempting, to tremble in the midst of horror feels completely understandable, to stop trying to birth love in the world feels unacceptable."

I want to pause on that phrase—"to stop trying to birth love in the world feels unacceptable." That is our work isn't it? To make sure that love is still born, that this love of God perseveres, despite any personal cost to ourselves. I know we have often said, "loves wins" when talking in and amongst ourselves, but right now it feels more imperative than ever—more like "love *must* win" otherwise, why do we even show up for church on a Sunday morning or any other day of the week?

On November 22, our congregation will join with other congregations, including a local Jewish community, for a service of peace and thanksgiving at Southminster Presbyterian Church. We are invited for coffee and pie at 6:30 p.m. and the service will start at 7:00 p.m. Please consider attending. This is another way we can birth love into the world, by adding our prayers for peace, across traditions, across time and space.

And here is my one plug for Stewardship—as a community that prays together, plays together and serves together, let us not forget that we are stewarding peace together, we are stewarding love together and we are stewarding hope together—through our actions, through our financial giving, through our prayer lives.



pm. We will start each time with a short video of one of the contributors of the book.




Sunday School continues with the WHO IS GOD? – Engaging The Mystery from the


#### ENNEAGRAM STUDY

Red Paint, the Ancestral Autobiography of a Coast Salish Punk by Sasha taqwšeblu LaPointe, c. 2022.

"Sasha taqšblu LaPointe, a Coast Salish indigenous woman, has always longed for a sense of home. As a child her family moved around frequently, often



staying in barely habitable church attics and trailers, dangerous places for young Sasha. As an adolescent determined to escape the poverty and abuse of her childhood in order to build a better future for herself and her people, Sasha throws herself headlong into the world, with little more to guide her than a passion for the thriving punk scene of the Pacific Northwest and a desire to live up to the responsibility of being the namesake of her beloved great-grandmother, a linguist who helped preserve her indigenous language of Lushootseed and one in a long line of powerful ancestors."

#### <u>Earth Ministry Update:</u> Residential Gas Rates Increase is Unacceptable

Puget Sound Energy (PSE) wants to raise residential gas rates by 3.45%. This is

unacceptable when PSE is already Washington's most expensive utility and many customers are struggling or unable to pay their bills. Instead of focusing on investing in energy efficiency, energy storage, time-varying rates, demand response and other measures that would accelerate the transition to clean energy, as well as improve reliability and lower customer costs, PSE continues to invest in fossil fuels.

For many years, the Earth Ministry/WAIPL community has been opposed to PSE's Tacoma LNG facility in solidarity with the Puyallup Tribe who oppose the project due to its violations of their treaty rights. While the Tribe and several environmental groups continue to fight the project's clean air permit in court, PSE now wants to recover costs associated with Tacoma LNG's construction.

We know that #FrackedGasIsNotFaithful, and that significantly raising energy bills for Washingtonians to pay for more fossil fuel infrastructure does not care for our communities, benefit our shared air and waters, or bring us towards a more just future. Adding insult to injury, nearly all of the gas used by the Tacoma LNG facility will NOT benefit PSE customers and will instead fuel TOTE Maritime's ships. PSE claims the facility will provide cleaner fuel for marine shipping. Studies show that Liquefied Natural Gas is just as bad for climate as other marine bunker fuels when lifecycle emissions are counted.

Even if LNG was cleaner, the cost of cleaning up the shipping industry should not be borne by residential customers. Residential customers would only use approximately 2% of the use of the facility, yet are being asked to pay for 43% of the construction costs.

### Helping Asylum Seekers at Highline United Methodist Church

Many of us have seen the news reports regarding the 300+ asylum seekers currently living in tents at Riverton Park Church in Tukwila, 100 of whom are children or pregnant people. Highline United Methodist Church (that hosts the Severe Weather Shelter NPUCC supports during both cold and hot months) is also currently hosting 30+ people at their facility. As the weather turns colder, HUMC will be faced with the challenge of serving both asylum seekers and other unhoused neighbors needing a warm place to spend the night.

Many government resources that support newly arriving migrants have already been earmarked for the fiscal cycle or cannot be used because of various immigration statuses. So, Church Council of Greater Seattle (CCGS) and the Jewish Coalition for Immigrant Justice Northwest are working with 30 other community groups to respond to immediate needs, including supporting HUMC.

#### Advent Workshop: Embrace the Darkness


