This month, we will begin a new worship and spiritual growth series combining the work of Robin Wall Kimmerer's book *The Serviceberry* and a sermon series called *Counterculture*. During this season of stewardship we will be thinking about how to live generously, love boldly, and embrace our true identity in Christ.

Robin Wall Kimmerer invites readers to live into the idea that abundance and reciprocity is indeed possible in the world we are living in right now. She speaks of a "gift economy" where all might flourish. This is a countercultural message! And because of that, having a sermon series titled *Counterculture* makes a lot of sense.

We live in a world that constantly tells us who we are—often defining our worth by what we have, what we do, or how we compare. But scripture offers a different truth: that we are beloved children of God, created in God's image, and called to live lives of compassion, purpose, and generosity.

To do that, we must sometimes go against the grain—to be countercultural in the best and most faithful sense. Throughout this stewardship season, we will also reflect on how our financial giving is a vital expression of our faith. Our individual giving makes a bigger impact and difference when we pool our resources together. And when we reframe from a transactional mentality of "I give therefore I get" to a frame work "I give because all life is a gift" we begin to adopt the abundance mindset that Jesus was always talking about in the kin-dom of God.

At the end of our stewardship season, each household will be invited to prayerfully submit an Estimate of Giving Card for 2026 (also known as a pledge)—not as a contract, but as a spiritual commitment, a next step in

growing our faith through intentional and proportional giving.

This is not just about funding a budget. It is about forming a people—disciples who resist the culture of scarcity and self-interest, and instead live into the abundance of God's grace and the call to love our neighbors as ourselves. Over the next weeks, you'll hear more through worship, testimonies, mission stories, and materials that will help you engage with this theme in personal and meaningful ways.

I ask you to begin praying now—not just about a number on a card, but about the deeper transformation God might be inviting in your heart and your household. Let us be shaped not by the world, but by the One who made us. Let us step into the freedom of living faithfully and giving generously. Let us walk this countercultural path—together.


We continue the study of Bad Girls of the Bible


Here are a couple of questions to ponder:

Honoring our Creator God,

We at Normandy Park United Church of Christ commit ourselves as a congregation to care for all Creation. We acknowledge that we belong to God and all that God has created.

As stewards of the earth, we continue to inform ourselves of ways to restore, replenish, heal.

As witnesses to apathy for Creation, we seek restorative justice for oppressed people, endangered species and future generations to come.

Our commitment to God's Creation shall extend to all of our church life through stewardship, worship, and actions. It will faithfully guide our hearts and minds.

Every spring and fall, billions of birds migrate across North America, navigating mostly under the cover of darkness. Artificial lights pose a serious threat, attracting and disorienting the birds, leading to dangerous collisions with buildings. The solution is simple: Flip the switch, and turn off the lights.

By reducing unnecessary lighting, the growing international "Lights Out" movement is making an impact, saving birds while conserving energy and lowering costs.

As fall migration gets underway, here are some ways you can keep the skies darker at night and help birds stay out of harm's way:

- Turn off non-essential lights from 11 PM until 6 AM during critical migration periods.
- Turn off or dim lobby and atrium lights.
- Turn off or dim interior home lighting or draw blinds to prevent light escaping.
- Turn off decorative landscape lighting.
- Turn off lights before leaving the home or office.
- Be sure outside lights are aimed down and well shielded.
- Install motion sensors on outside lights to reduce use.
