

Dear Siblings in Christ,

As we enter the Advent season, we will follow along in the Gospel of Luke, asking the question, "How does a weary world rejoice?" Just how do we celebrate, with hope and anticipation, the in breaking of the Christ child in this world when so much has gone wrong? How do we claim joy anyway, even when



there is so much violence, so much mean spiritedness, so much grief in our world today? I hope you will wrestle with these questions with me and with our community of faith this season.

On Sunday, after we have lit that first candle of hope, we will have some things for you to do and to take home with you (and if you are mostly on zoom these days, we can mail this out to you as well!): we have an Advent devotional and an Advent calendar, there are more votive Advent candles to pick up if you need to replenish your set from last year; and last but not least, we will have 20 gingerbread house kits to build in the Fellowship Hall as our Advent workshop activity. So, whether young or young at heart, come prepared to build a gingerbread house that dares to spark joy. One of the ways we can rejoice together is by having a little fun together with a lot of sugar icing and gum drops to carry us through.

Within the Advent devotional, which I hope you will refer to each week of Advent, you will have the opportunity to reflect on what brings you joy and where the weariness has lived. There is gorgeous artwork, gospel reflections, poetry to read, and some music to too!

The Second Sunday of Advent there is an opportunity to go caroling after worship (talk to Alice if you are interested); the Third Sunday of Advent we will have our annual pageant where everyone can participate, and the Fourth Sunday of Advent this year is also Christmas Eve—so you can come to one or two worship services that day—there will be something for everyone and lots of wonderful music and carols at both services.

This Advent, let us hold space for our weariness and our joy. May we be intentional about making time for God who knows what we are carrying—who knows where the joy and the pain resides in us. We can so easily be swept away with overwhelm this time of year...so let us carve out some space in our hearts and minds for the arrival of the Christ child.




Many Messiahs Concert

Trailer traveled less than 5 miles from dealership to our backyard near convention center in Yakima, WA. Includes ramp, all locks, wheel lock, trailer dolly. Value: \$5000.
